Pikelet Recipe

2 cups of self raising flour, pinch of salt & 1/2 cup sugar. Mix together. Beat one egg with 1 cup of milk and add to dry ingredients. Beat until smooth. Add extra milk if required until medium consistency. Cover and place in the fridge for at least 20 minutes or overnight. Tip punnet of blueberries (or other berries) into the mixture and stir to mix. Place spoonfuls of the mixture into medium pan for approx. 2 minutes, turn. Enjoy.

The Child Safe Standards

The Child Safe Standards at a glance

The seven Child Safe Standards are compulsory minimum standards for all organisations that provide services to children including Victorian schools. The aim of the Standards is to ensure organisations are well prepared to protect children from abuse and neglect



Standard 1: *Strategies to embed an organisational culture of child safety, including through effective leadership arrangements.*

What does this mean?

Inglewood PS is committed to providing a child safe environment where children and young people are safe and feel safe, and their voices are heard about decisions that affect their lives.

We review our processes and protocols annually or as the need arises. Inglewood PS' Child Safety Officer is the Acting Principal, Lex Johnstone and in his absence, Bernie Zimora and Bec Luckman. Anyone with any concerns about the safety and wellbeing of any child at Inglewood PS is encouraged to contact the school.

Inglewood PS will always take into account the diversity of all children, including (but not limited to) the needs of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children, children from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds, children with disabilities, and children who are vulnerable; and make reasonable efforts to accommodate such diversity.

Every person involved in Inglewood PS has a responsibility to understand the important and specific role he/she plays individually and collectively to ensure that the wellbeing and safety of all children and young people is at the forefront of all they do and every decision they make.

This week we have continued our work on writing reports. We have written reports about animals and reports about our fellow students.



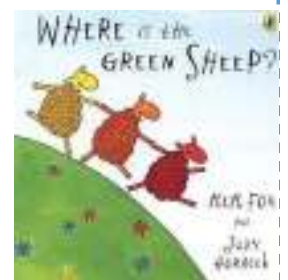
Mathematics

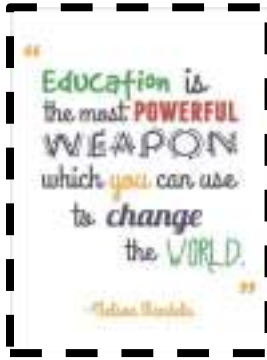
We have been working hard on our angles study and have started to work on location and transformation. We also had Lexi teach a maths lesson this week.

Maths

On Monday we are going to start exploring position and Location. By the end of the two weeks all students should be able to give and follow directions to familiar locations (VCMMG099). The types of vocabulary we will be using is above, below, beside, next to, under, right hand side, left hand side, opposite, on the corner of, directions and on. You could ask them some questions using these words at home. Some of the key teaching points will be understanding that people need to give and follow directions to and from a place, and that this involves turns, direction and distance. Understanding the meaning and importance of words such as 'clockwise', 'anticlockwise', 'forward' and 'under' when giving and following directions. Interpreting and following directions around familiar locations

One of our activities will be :Story maps: Have students draw a map of the place or setting of their favourite story

Literacy

We have been working on Information reports. An information report provides readers with information on chosen a topic by providing them with facts. Generally an information report is written to provide facts about a living or non-living object. It can be an individual object or a group of objects.

Students have chosen an animal and are doing a wonderful job at making their own information book.
